February 6th

Peter Barwick will talk about Tree Fruits. Most of us have at least one tree in the garden and it would be good to get the most from it. Trips 2020

Sunday 26th April 9am Lacock Abbey, Fox Talbot Museum and Village £26 - N.T. £16

Lacock Abbey is a country house with monastic roots and Britain's birthplace of photography. It has been used for many films - Harry Potter, Wolf Hall and Pride and Prejudice, to name just a few.

The village looks much like it did 200 years ago, with timber-framed cottages and shops, and was the setting for Cranford, Downton Abbey and many more.

There are two eating places - the Courtyard Tearoom and the Stables Café.

Sunday 14th June 9am

Cotswold Wildlife Park and Gardens £26

Set in over 160 acres of parkland, the park has a diverse collection of species, many of which are endangered in the wild. The beautiful gardens are carefully tended by a creative team of gardeners who have made every corner of the park a joy to visit.

There is a restaurant serving hot meals and snacks.

I am repeating this trip because many of you requested a return visit!

Sunday 26th July 9am Mapperton House and Gardens £26

Home to the Earl and Countess or Sandwich, Mapperton is a glorious sandstone manor house among tumbling hills and countryside. The house has guided tours only, which I book in advance.

There is a Coach House Café.

Let's hope we can visit this time, as previously this was cancelled due to filming in 2019.

Sunday 13th September 9am Waddesdon Manor £28 - N.T. £16

This has been home to the Rothschilds, the most powerful banking family of the 19th century. During your visit you will get to see amazing architecture, art collections and beautiful gardens.

There are many eating places at Waddesdon and also a large Gift Shop.

Down the Rabbit Hole!

Down we went, into the magical wonderful world of Alice at Hever Castle – the destination for the December Outing.

What a great day we had with so much to see and experience. The theme of Alice was well thought out, so that all ages could wonder at the story telling. Meeting the King and Queen of Hearts plus the White Rabbit and Mad Hatter while walking through the gardens was such fun, and to see vignettes of the story in all corners of the grounds. Over the drawbridge and into the Castle courtyard we were faced with the biggest Christmas tree – all beautifully decorated and then to everyone's delight – snow flurries covered it and us (OK, so there was a snow machine, situated at an upper window but it was pure magic all the same).

Within the Castle each room was decorated with a Christmas tree depicting a part of the story of Alice in Wonderland, and what beautiful rooms, so well laid out and despite it being a Castle seemed very homely and welcoming. Outside again for another walk, past the Galloping Horses Carousel, old-fashioned Hoop-La and stalls selling hot chestnuts and drinks, through the Rose Garden (which must be incredible in the Summer) and the featured hedge topiary in the shape of chess pieces, to the boat house on the lake. Within the boat house a temporary home was provided for the Husky Welfare and Rescue Society, difficult to resist smuggling one of the lovely dogs back to the coach!

Another short walk and we came across the miniature house display with each house depicting a different era, superbly crafted – you almost felt able to walk through the houses and gardens.

To top off the day, at around 3.15pm, the lights came on all over the trees and topiary shrubs and even the Castle itself, making a magical Christmassy end to the day out.
