Varieties are: Sweetheart (early season), and Cambridge Favourite (mid-season).

There are be 100 of each. Price is £1.00 each.

Store - Composts for 2022

Recognising the inevitable move towards peat-free composts, and the phasing out of those containing peat, we have increased the range of peat-free composts at the Store. So that members can make an informed choice, we have identified which composts contain peat, or not, as below.

Multipurpose

Melcourt Sylvagrow 50lt Peat-Free
Bullrush 40lt Peat-Free
SHL Universal 75lt Peat-Based

Evergreen 50lt Peat-Based (being phased out)

Potting SHL Potting & Bedding 75lt Peat-Reduced

Seed SHL Seed with Vermiculite 75lt Peat-Based

Ericaceous Melcourt 50lt Peat-Free
John Innes 1, 2, 3 & Seed 25lt Contains Peat
Growbags Evergreen 36lt Peat-Based

All the SHL composts will also be available in ¼ bags.

The Bullrush compost is the replacement for the Evergreen 50lt. Having used some of it to pot up bulbs, I found that it was more fibrous than the Melcourt. Not surprisingly the peat-free composts tend to be more expensive but the cost of nearly all compost has risen, presumably because of Covid and supply difficulties.

Accounts for 1/11/20 to 31/10/21

This has been another year where our expenditure has been much lower than usual due to both Shows having to be cancelled again, and our Monthly Meetings curtailed until August due to Covid restrictions. But, thanks to increased support on Saturdays from our members, income from the Store was up by an amazing 20% and Plant & Tool sales by about 15%. The end result was that the 2020/2021 a/cs, see page 6, show a large surplus of £3,659.87.

In November 2021, (i.e. in the current financial year), the Trip a/c, with HSBC, was moved to come under the umbrella of the Society's main a/c with Santander. This was done because HSBC had decided to impose bank charges, even on Community a/cs. Ann will still manage the day-to-day finances for the trips, but financial transactions will be via the main a/c and therefore, in future, cheques for trips will need to be made out to just 'Purbrook Horticultural Society'. We hope members will find this a reasonably seamless change.
