Not for the latest productions of the 'Sound Of Music' or 'Sister Act' but to please provide an exhibit for the Spring and Summer Shows. So often we overhear comments such as 'I've grown those and mine look as good or even better' - yet people seem to feel afraid to take that leap and decide to enter.

Although the Shows are judged, everyone from the more experienced to even the judges themselves, willingly give advice and encouragement, so if you are walking through the garden and spot a lovely Daffodil; Rose; Dahlia; Tomato or Onion please do enter it in a Show.

The Spring Show is a good place to start, because if you bought the bulbs at the Store you will have lovely blooms! The Summer Show is more varied and enables members to showcase other talents such as Baking; Handicrafts and Floral Art while also entering Flowers; Fruit and Vegetables, and with 2023 having a few new classes an even greater chance of winning.

## **Accounts for 2021/2022**

A summary of the accounts for the Society, as presented at the AGM, is on page 6. A copy of the full accounts, which have been audited, can be seen at the Trading Store.

One or two items probably need some additional explanation: In the General a/c - The deficit, or cost, of putting on the shows should in fact be significantly more because we have still not received the bill from Hants. County Council for the use of Crookhorn School for the Summer Show, which for our last show in 2019 was over £700.

The income from both Plant and Tool sales, and Preserves, were record amounts this year.

The transfer to Floral Art was to help with the high cost of their demonstrators and was effectively the £1,000 that Waterlooville Allotments and Gardens very generously gave to us when they had to close.

In the Trading a/c - The income was the highest since 2009 and was 20% up on last year. The closing stock figure is unusually high because we bought our bulk stock in early this year to beat impending price increases. The operating costs included the laying of the new concrete which cost nearly £1,000.

In the Trip a/c, managed by Ann - the final figures are misleading, because most of the ticket monies for this year's trips was paid in advance last year, or carried over from Covid cancelled trips. The account still has a healthy balance of over £1,500 as shown in the Assets.

In the Floral Art a/c, managed by Monica - the £1,000 transfer has enabled them to have a healthy balance to start the coming year.

The final section indicates that, overall, our assets have increased by more than £1,500 this year, although the actual figure is subject to the accuracy of our stocktake figures.

Seed Potatoes on order for delivery in early February are - 1<sup>st</sup> Early - Casablanca, Pentland Javelin, Winston 2<sup>nd</sup> Early - Charlotte, Kestrel, Marfona Main Crop - Desiree, Maris Piper, Valor

They will be available in pre-packs of 2kg but we can split some for smaller quantities if required. The slightly later delivery date of February is to help avoid frost damage whilst in our Store, particularly important if the recent very cold spell comes back again in January.
