### **Monthly Meetings**

### **Thursday 1st February**

#### The History of Stansted House

Stansted House is a Grade 2 listed Edwardian building which we are lucky to have right on our doorstep. It Is in the parish of Stoughton and is situated in a 1,800 acre park. Up to 1983 it was the home of the 10th Earl of Bessborough. There has been a house on this site since 1688, though several houses were built on the land before this.

The chapel of St. Paul was built in the 1800s and is a Grade 1 listed building.

We look forward to finding out a bit more about the way of life in this house in its heyday and what is planned for the future.

#### Thursday 7th March

#### From Marching to Mulching

The Tuppenny Barn project based in Southbourne was founded 18 years ago. It is a charity that organises school visits for children aged 3-18 to teach them about food education. The staff run green therapy garden sessions and have a project for young carers. This was featured in *Gardener's World* in April 2023. There are also activities for the community, such as foraging, wreath making, bee keeping and willow weaving. The shop is open on a Thursday and sells organic bread, cakes, eggs, preserves and vegetables and flowers grown on the site. So far over £250,000 has been raised to fund and develop this charity.

Maggie Haynes is the CEO of Tuppenny Barn and will give this talk to our group.

#### Thursday 4th April

#### **Cunard History and Glamorous Stars**

Steve Herra has given us an interesting talk before about the liner QE2, which was the last ship he worked on. He is a third generation employee of Cunard and still gives guided tours when the ships are in dock at Southampton. This talk will cover some of the insider facts of the many famous people who sailed on the liners and their odd ways, including an actress who brought her own chickens on board so that her eggs would be fresh every day!

### **Hever Castle and Tulip Festival**

Childhood home of Anne Boleyn, bought by Geoffrey Boleyn in 1462, with various owners through the centuries. It was purchased by William Waldorf Astor in 1903. The castle will have arrangements of tulips inside for the Festival. The gardens open at 10.30am and the castle at 12 noon. Included in the price is a castle multi-media guide, collected at entrance. Catering is cashless.

#### Sunday 9th June 9am £36 Penshurst Place and Gardens

Once the home of Henry VIII, left to his son, King Edward VI and granted to Viscount De L'Isle, forebear Sir William Sidney in 1552. The Sidney family have been occupants for more than 460 years. It is still a family home and welcomes visitors to discover the charm of Penshurst.

Hot meals are available and light snacks. Gardens open 10am-5pm. House open 11.30am - 3.30pm. Gift Shop and Plant Centre 9am - 5pm. Café 9am -5pm.

#### Sunday 21st July 9am £20 Wisley Gardens

Hopefully we will see the gardens in their full glory.

#### Sunday 8th September 9am £36 (tbc) Abbotsbury Sub-tropical Garden

The garden originates from 1765 when the Countess of Ilchester built a castle on the site overlooking Lyme Bay. A wall was built for a sheltered kitchen garden. This walled garden is now the heart of the gardens. The range of plants was increased by the 4th Earl, who was a botanist. The garden trebled in size by the 19th century. The castle burnt down in 1915. The garden was restored in the 1960s.

Proper Cornish pasties and homemade light snacks, available from 12 noon to 2pm.

### Treasurer's Report

Copies of the accounts to 31st October 2023 can be seen at the Store. These show that it has been another good year for the Society, with Income exceeding Expenditure.

In the General a/c the main expenditure items were the shows, which includes the cost of the school for the weekend of nearly £1,000, and for updating, refurbishing and replacing some of our trophies. Other expenditure included £625.00 for printing our quarterly Gazette, done by St. Johns Church at a very competitive price. Our monthly meetings cost £1,581.82, for which the only offset is income from the raffles. Speakers these days average about £100.00. Plants and Tool sales, and Preserves, did well again and we have benefited from increased interest rates on our deposit a/c, amounting to £772.31. Donations include those to charitable causes in memory of the several long-term members we have sadly lost this year.

The Trading a/c reflects another very good trading year with a further increase in turn-over giving a total for the year of £19,371.24, a massive increase on less than £11,000 three years ago. The operating costs include the annual rent, currently £350, and electricity etc. We finished with a healthy surplus of £1,596.97.

The Trip a/c, managed by Ann, finished with a small surplus of £35.75, emphasising what good value they have been - virtually cost price. So, no wonder we have already banked a lot of advance payments for next year's trips.

The Floral Art a/c, managed by Monica, also showed a surplus this year, which must be encouraging, bearing in mind how expensive their demonstrators tend to be.

The last section compares our overall assets with the same time last year and shows a healthy surplus of £1,326.41.

### Clearance at Back of Parking Lot

If you are on social media and a member of the PHS, you can see the progress made in clearing the mass of brambles and accumulated detritus that has built up over the years. If you are not on social media, you can see the photos on the noticeboard at the Store.

Geoff and Sandy, were a fantastic help which enabled us to clear the back and bottom fence areas. We still have more work to do, but we've 'broken the back of it'. We need to dispose of the stuff we have uncovered, and when the cut brambles, etc. have dried out we will need to have a bonfire to get rid of it. Alternatively, we could contact HBC or their contractor, to see if they can remove it with our help. They are responsible for maintaining the grass/brambles/borders. I think the next stage when all is clear is to simply put down grass seed that will hopefully allow the area to be easily maintained.

The work has improved the general appearance at the rear of the Store and together with trimming the brambles around our site, it has created more parking space, and allows better manoeuvring of vehicles coming and going safely on site.
