Meeting 3rd October

Mike Read gave us a very entertaining talk with photos of Scotland from the west coast across to the Cairngorms in the east.

Starting in the area around Fort William which is only about 5 miles from Ben Nevis he saw and filmed pine martens, white-tailed eagles, otters, twite and red-throated divers.

From here he drove across to the Cairngorms along Loch Ness seeing scoter ducks, long-tailed ducks, gannets and ring ouzels. In the area around Balmoral he spotted Alpine Lady's mantle and Creeping Lady's Tresses, the latter is known as the Scottish Orchid and is nationally scarce. Mike also saw Cloudberries, these plants are only found in Arctic conditions and produce strange orange fruit. They are not eaten raw but used in jams and flavourings. In Scandinavian countries where they are more prolific they are very expensive as they do not transport well. In the Cairngorms National Park he also saw and photographed the amazingly large Capercaillies and the smaller Black Grouse. His knowledge of the area was infectious and we enjoyed the evening.

While browsing the maps of Scotland, I have found a place I want to live, it is called 'Rest and be Thankful'. I'm only hoping it's not a McDonalds!

Spring Show

As you are hopefully all aware, the Society Spring Show is taking place on Sunday 16th March 2025.

This is one of the main events this Society runs.

Show entries are a great way of showcasing your talent and hard work. So don't be shy - if you grew it or made it - why not exhibit it?

There are many classes - 'experts' and 'novice' classes are available in most categories. Don't forget the children's classes - get them started and they may just get the 'bug'.

How about growing some Dahlias for the Summer Show

As a society we are lucky to attract some specialist growers whose exhibits generate a 'Wow Factor' - the response of visitors amazed by the size or perfection of their exhibits.

This is currently especially true in the Dahlia Section where three exhibitors vie for the honours with huge near perfect blooms. The downside of this however, is that we attract few, if any, dahlia entries from other members of the Society who feel that their entries, though quite respectable, may appear paltry in comparison.

To rectify this reticence and persuade more of our members to grow dahlias to enter in the show and develop a competitive dahlia growing community within the Society, the 2025 Summer Show Schedule will include two new Dahlia classes, but these will not be in the Dahlia Section but in the General Flower Section.

The two classes are:

5 blooms of a single variety of double dahlia and 5 Blooms of a single variety of single or collarette dahlia.

The variety must be stated and the size of the bloom will be

marked against the potential size of blooms of that variety, so in terms of which variety to choose to grow, a variety with uniform well-formed blooms may well be preferable to the giant bloom varieties. Additionally, if space is a problem, it may well be easier to generate 5 blooms of the slightly smaller varieties.

The Specialist Dahlia growers with entries in two or more classes in the main Dahlia Section will not be able to enter these Dahlia Classes in the Flower Section.

It is hoped that, having read this, you will decide to grow dahlias to enter in the Show and rapidly access catalogues and buy your dahlia tubers in time to produce blooms to enter in the 2025 Summer Show.

Treasurer's Report

There are four main a/cs that cover the activities of the Society; the General a/c, the Trading a/c, both of which I look after, and the Trips and Floral Art a/cs, for which Ann Richardson and Monica Bone respectively, are the treasurers.

Overall, the outcome for the year was a surplus of £2,057.62, so another good year financially for the Society.

The General a/c, which includes anything not covered by the other a/cs, such as Meetings, Gazettes, Shows, Plant Sales, Subs, etc. showed a small deficit of £187.63, with Plant Sales, Subs and Bank Interest being the main sources of income.

The Store had a busy year, with another increase in turnover, being double that of four years ago, and yielded a surplus of £1,587.33.

The Trips were well supported again, finishing with a surplus of over £400, which will be used to help offset the costs for the 2025 trips.

Floral Art also had a good year, ending with only a small deficit after covering the high costs of their demonstrators.

A summary of the a/cs is on page 7.

Trading Report

Another very busy year at the Store, with turnover of almost £22,000. Major contributions to this were the sale of more than a thousand bags of Evergreen compost and a huge amount of wood chips.

The new access gates in the fence for pallets have proved their worth with the need for more frequent deliveries.

Recently we have been negotiating a new 5 year lease with Havant BC which should be in place soon. After some debate, the new annual rent will be $\pounds 475$, a smaller increase than they had originally proposed. Currently the cost is $\pounds 350$.

Unfortunately, there is a downside to the success of the Store, and that is the need for more able-bodied helpers, particularly during the busy Spring and Summer times.

The current helpers have been helping for many years, and we desperately need some younger blood. If you can help, please speak to one of us at the Store - and there is a potential 'bonus' as regular helpers get a 5% discount on purchases!
